Endowment

St. Stephen's FY21 financial returns on investments were solid, adding more than \$1.1 million to our endowment whose value at the end of the fiscal year was **\$14,225,015**. These resources allow for increased student financial aid and support, enhancements to signature programs, competitive award programs for faculty, and investments in our campus.

For the restricted funds within the endowment as a whole, the School draws roughly 3.5% of the return on investment to fund the specific programs that these restricted funds were established to support. The payout from the endowment is precisely calibrated and adjusted annually, based on market performance, inflation, and other factors.

Donors to endowed funds provide support for current operations as well as the promise that future generations of students will receive the very best college preparatory education and our faculty benefit from ongoing professional development.

Dear generous friends,

I wanted to thank you for the immense privilege you have granted me: to go to St. Stephen's. Now that I've spent four months there, I've been able to experience much of what SSS has to offer, be it teachers, resources, or a fabulous student body.

All of the teachers are overqualified and experts at transmitting their passion for their subject to their students. I never viewed myself as "someone who could possibly be able to succeed in Math", but for the first time in my life I am actually "good" and confident in Math. This is partially due to how thorough my middle school math curriculum was, and primarily because of the palpable joy Mr. Leonardi has when he teaches, and his confidence in all his students,

Our English teacher, Mrs. Egan on the other hand is a true character. She teaches classics with a flare: there is a constant presence of dad jokes (which are supposed to be funny) that Mrs. Egan uses to explain the intricacies of Odysseus' relationship with Calypso or how Morrison uses Cinderella's story as a metaphor for educated women in the work force and on and on.

She put together an intricate and never-ending reading list, which nonetheless is a perfect blend of modern and ancient, female and male and racially and point of view wise diverse authors. So far, we've read Catcher in the Rye, The Source of Self-Regard by Toni Morrison, and The Odyssey. Among the books we still have to get through are Nickel Boys by Colson Whitehead, Why We Should All Be Feminists by Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie, and Persepolis by Marjane Satrapi.

Another subject with an exquisite reading list is Italian Literature. We have been studying in depth the literary movement in Italy called Neorealismo and reading novels of the same movement. These novels include Io non ho paura by Niccolò Ammaniti, Il sentiero dei nidi di ragno by Italo Calvino, a graphic novel version of Anne Frank's diary and Se questo è un uomo by Primo Levi. All of these tales are gorgeously written and in class we analyze them thoroughly enough to have an even greater appreciation of the genius minds of all of their authors.

Mind you, Italian Literature wouldn't be half the fun without Cecilia Negroni: she refuses to be called "Miss anything" and insists instead on "Cecilia" or "prof." Her character is even more peculiar and amusing than Mrs. Egan.

Her (actually spectacular) humor sustains us through the long hours of analyses or stressful interrogazioni (frequent oral exams). Though she is incredibly funny and engaging, she is the strictest, most stubborn and "old wayed" teacher by far: some dare call her a tyrant. Her personality and way of teaching brings back tender memories of the best teachers I had in the Italian school system and gives me a sense of "same" in an environment I've never experienced (I've never studied in English or gone to a private school).

School, though it offers a crazy amount of intellectual stimulation, wouldn't be half as fun without all of the friends I've made. Just as the English reading list is diverse, so are my new friends: both in their familial backgrounds and in their characters. I enjoy having a group of friends with starkly different personalities and experiences between themselves.

I've tried to condense the marvelous experiences I've had so far to give you a picture of all that I am grateful for and all that is possible because of your support. Even though I've only been there four months, and we're doing school differently because of Covid, I can tell that this is an extraordinary school and opportunity. Thank you.

Thorned Remembrances

The Pope-Ullman Service Trips Program

The Pope-Ullman scholarship fund for spring and summer service trips was established by Sarah Eugenie Maine '95 and Valerie Maine '99, through a gift from the Ruth and Hal Launders Charitable Trust. As St. Stephen's School alumnae, they understand the great impact that the SSS trips program has on students; they themselves have long-lasting and very fond memories of their own trip experiences.



With this in mind, they established a fund in the names of two outstanding members of the faculty: Dr. Helen Pope and Mr. Jack Ullman, both of whom travelled across the globe with St. Stephen's students, promoting a sense of adventure and fun, always expanding the walls of their classrooms.

The Pope-Ullman Fund provides financial aid to those students who otherwise would not be able to participate in the SSS spring and/or summer service trip experience. With the ongoing, generous support of donors, the Pope-Ullman Scholarship Fund enables current and future students to explore and discover the world and themselves.

Last summer, Italy-based service trips were offered to:
